THE GOAL OF ERWC IS TO PROMOTE POSTSECONDARY SUCCESS FOR <u>ALL</u> STUDENTS BY PREPARING THEM FOR THE LITERACY AND COMMUNICATION DEMANDS THEY ARE LIKELY TO ENCOUNTER IN COLLEGE AND CAREER.





### What is **ERWC**?

The Expository Reading and Writing Curriculum (ERWC) is a full-year course at the 11th and 12th grades employing an inquiry-based, rhetorical **approach** with an **integrated** reading, writing, and oral communication curriculum designed to increase the academic preparation of diverse students with varied learning needs.





### A Few Facts about ERWC

- Began in 2004 as joint effort of high school teachers and CSU faculty to address gaps in student learning that hindered the successful transition from high school to college for many students.
- The subsequent 12th grade course that was developed focused on rhetorical analysis and critical reading and writing.
- In 2006, ERWC was approved by the University of California and the CSU as a year-long college-preparatory English satisfying the "b" English requirement in the "a-g" sequence.





### A Few Facts about ERWC

- To date, more than 16,000 educators across California have participated in ERWC professional learning seminars. More than 1,000 CA high schools have adopted the ERWC as a full-year, 12th grade course.
- Expansion has continued into the 9th, 10th, and 11th grades and into other states.









### **ERWC Is Teacher Influenced**


Developed *by* teachers *for* teachers in a continuing collaboration between high school and university faculty, the ERWC modules are being used by teachers in **five** states.

### ERWC Leads to Success Preparation for College and/or Career

The successful completion of the course at grades 11 and/or 12 indicates that students have been introduced to and practiced the **critical thinking**, **reading**, **writing**, **speaking**, and **listening skills** necessary for success in college and career.









### ERWC Helps Students Develop Healthy Habits of Mind





ERWC is designed to instill the strategies, abilities, and habits of mind of fluent academic readers and writers through rhetorical analysis of compelling issues and interesting texts that allow students to transfer those literacy skills to new situations.





### **ERWC Offers a Practical Curriculum**

Transfer of Learning and Universal Design for Learning

The ERWC emphasizes transfer of learning; a variety of literary and informational texts and writing and speaking tasks; the inclusion of integrated and designated English language development; and features from **Universal Design for Learning**, including student goal setting and formative assessment.







### What does an **ERWC course** look like?

Teachers construct a year-long course by selecting from among pairings of concept **mini-modules** and full-length issue, book, drama, and poetry **modules** representing diverse authors and perspectives and **aligned with CA English Language Arts/Literacy and English Language Development standards.** 

You build your curriculum with choice! You select the modules and the activities with intentionality based on your students' needs and interests.

### ERWC Is NOT...

- A remedial, packet-based, or "watered down" curriculum
- Only a college-prep class

ERWC introduces students to and gives them practice applying the analytical and critical thinking skills we want <u>all</u> community members to have and be able to apply.

- A sacrifice of "teaching English" (there's still literature and drama, but also enhanced opportunities to teach literacy skills that will transfer to other situations and disciplines.)
- A prescriptive "script" to teach from
- A lockstep approach to teaching







### **ERWC Offers Flexibility and Respect**

- The curriculum allows teachers the **flexibility** to make pedagogical decisions based on formative assessments and their own professional expertise and experience.
- Respect for the professional expertise of teachers and the intelligence of students is central to the philosophy of ERWC.





### **ERWC Principles**

- 1. The **integration** of interactive reading and writing processes;
- 2. A rhetorical approach that fosters critical thinking and engagement through **a relentless focus on the text**;
- 3. Materials and themes that **engage student interest**;
- Classroom activities designed to model and foster successful practices of fluent readers and writers;
- 5. Research-based methodologies with a consistent relationship between **theory and practice**;
- 6. **Built-in flexibility** to allow teachers to respond to varied students' needs and instructional contexts; and
- 7. **Alignment** with California's Common Core State **Standards** for English Language Arts and Literacy.





### **ERWC Assignment Template**

Each module employs the same template to provide scaffolding and practice in integrated processes of reading, writing, and oral communication, moving students from engaging with a professional text to creating their own text in response to the topic.



Through an online community of professional educators, teachers download the curriculum and other materials, post questions, and share resources.






### **ERWC Professional Learning**
